A Word from the Trustees

Trustees' Update: The United Methodist Church doctrine defines trustees as **'Christian stewards of property God has entrusted to the congregation**'. With that definition in mind, our faithful and diligent group of trustees meets once a month to discuss property issues of the church, identify items that need fixed, items that need improved, and projects that are possibilities for the future.

One such issue that came to our attention was the need to better accommodate seating in the sanctuary for attendees with disabilities, especially someone who may be using a wheelchair. So, after discussion and reviewing options, we decided to designate an area at the rear of the sanctuary and mark it 'Reserved Seating'. We relocated two chairs from the chancel area, so someone accompanying a wheelchair guest could also sit comfortably in the same area. We have received positive feedback from people who utilize the area, and others those who do not. But even though we have a designated seating area, we do NOT prohibit anyone from sitting in whatever location of the sanctuary they desire.

LCCM Council Of Delegates Meeting 10/15/2019

Mission Statement: Lebanon County Christian Ministries compassionately communicates God's love to the people of Lebanon County by serving their immediate felt needs, empowering their personal sustainability and sharing the heart of God with them.

Bud and Sue Green are the delegates representing Mt. Gretna United Methodist Church (MGUMC) at the LCCM Council of Delegates Meeting.

The meeting was held at South Lebanon Community Church, 13 Evergreen Road, Lebanon, PA.

"LCCM offers a wide variety of programs and services to address basic needs of people in our community. Services provided are based on need. Although income and expense information are requested of each client, these are not the sole determining factors for receiving assistance. Interviews of clients are completed each time they present themselves in need of assistance – regardless of the number of respective visits to LCCM. LCCM services are available to all Lebanon County residents."

LCCM provides; emergency shelter, food bank, clothing bank, heating oil, natural gas, water/sewer, free noon meal, summer food program and TEFAP and CSFP.

LCCM is the designated agency for Lebanon County to maintain the federally funded Emergency Food Assistance Program (TEFAP) and the Commodity Supplemental Food Program (CSFP).

The FRESH START program continues to flourish, with members from various churches, including MGUMC, providing meals to guests at the LCCM facility. If interested in helping please contact the coordinator at MGUMC, Bob Lauver. FRESH START Emergency Shelter and Resource Center does more than meals, it helps those who need to "get back on their feet", with assistance with employment, housing or other resources to support the life of LCCM guests. In 2018/2019, LCCM provided 5,555 nights of stay, hosted an average of 15 guests per night and 130 guests were discharged to housing.

Bryan D. Smith was introduced as the new Executive Director succeeding Troy Williams who was committed to follow the Lord, to a new ministry, as he was provided an opportunity to serve the Calvary Church. Troy had over 14 years of service to LLCM and the Lebanon Valley.

LCCM is on a fiscal year (June 2018 to June 2019); therefore, the financials were presented by the Treasurer Alan Howe. Comparing the period of 2017-2018 to 2018-2019; the former generated \$234,363 in Net Ordinary Income, while the latter generated \$70,342. The income for the 2018-2019, was bolstered by an extraordinary gift from the former Tabor Endowment of \$94,000. Part of the drop can be accounted for through the decrease support from the United Way along with the decrease in the Capital Campaign.
